
 Sustainable Development (SD): "development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs" (WCED p. 43).

Core Concerns/Values of Governments in Committing to Sustainable Development

Citizen accountabilities:

- Social responsibilities: addressing the needs of the poorest/most vulnerable, equality/justice, peace & order
- Environmental responsibilities: ministries of environment and environmental degradation
- Economic responsibilities: "appropriate" economic growth with broad benefits & not creating further harms/costs
- "Growth that Works for Everyone"

Government:

- voter appeal

Business:

- measures of efficiency and effectiveness for shareholders & stakeholders (ESG)
- measuring the neglected capitals (natural, human, & social capital) & risk

Non-profit and Voluntary Sector

- formal structural causes of NGOs reflected in SDGs (esp. human service and environmental NGOs)
- mobilization of volunteers & charitable giving (esp. celebrating achievement)




Regional Centers of Expertise on Education on Sustainable Development (ESD): A Global Experiment Mobilizing Volunteers for Sustainable Development


- Council motion in 2020
- The Energy & Sustainability Framework outlines a dynamic and living plan for the community to reach its goals of achieving net-zero greenhouse gas emissions and sourcing net-zero energy from renewable sources for the community of Regina by 2050.
- Unanimously approved by City Council on March 30, 2022



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Big Move 1 Retrofit Buildings

- Retrofit 100% of residential buildings by 2030 (Pre-1981) by 2035 (1981-2016 construction)
- Retrofit 100% of Industrial Commercial & Institutional buildings
 - Target: 50% energy savings and 10% electrical savings




Big Move 6 Increase Active Transportation & Transit-Use

- Expand transit service
 - Target: 25% transit mode share by 2025
- Transportation demand management
 - Reduce demand for personal vehicle use
- Increase active transportation
 - Target: 50% of short trips by 2050

Other Supporting Actions

 Direct 50% of new growth to intensification areas along transit nodes, 15% to the city centre, 35% to new neighbourhoods.

Background

- Council Motion in November 2019
- Direction to undertake Community Safety and Well-Being (CSWB) Plan
- Linking Regina's current level of crime to underlying root issues (i.e., food insecurity, substance use)
- Partnered with CMNCP to undertake work





What is CSWB?

- More than just the absence of crime
- A shift away from reactionary/incident-driven responses
- Collaborative and multi-sectoral approach
- Move to efforts and investments in long-term solutions – Need to address well-being of individuals

Community Safety Assessment



- 1. Existing Data/Statistics Gathering
 - Statistics Canada
 - Regina Police Service
 - Partners in Community reports, organizational website scans



- 2. CSWB Survey
 - Feb-April 2021
 - Over 1750 responses
 - Assessed perceptions and experiences of safety
- 3. Be Heard Regina Mapping



- "Places I Love" Tool collected information on places residents experience positive safety and where opportunities for improvement exist
- 4. Community Consultations



Community Consultations

- Consultations were held with a number of community groups to ensure a broad range of perspectives were captured in the data collection process.
- Approach was purposefully designed to highlight and elevate voices and perspectives that tend to be overlooked because of a range of barriers.






Saskatchewan Index of Wellbeing

The SIW report is a resource that expands our understanding of how well our communities and citizens are faring beyond the economic measures of the


Gross Domestic Product (GDP).


Services provided by local authorities define citizen well-being and residents' quality of life. Local authorities attract residents by improving community's quality of life through improved local services.

 Elected officials 8%






